

KAREN REFUGEE COMMITTEE MONTHLY REPORT MARCH

On March 2nd 1962, the Military, led by General Ne Win took over power in Burma with the express intention of preventing deterioration and disintegration of the Union. Burma, at that time was one of the most productive and developed Nations in South East Asia, being dubbed the "Rice Bowl" of Asia. One measure of the failure of the Military is that, Burma, from being one of the most prosperous nations is now being classified as one of the least developed countries in the World.

The Military's experimentation with the "Burmese way to socialism" and the stepped up effort to contain Ethnic dissent by force had led to large scale disruptions, resulting in the sorry mess that can be seen throughout the country. Production and the economy plummeted and a new class of people, the "Displaced" emerged, which problem still cannot be resolved unto this day. Burma was once a country where job opportunities were plentiful, attracting many foreign workers from India, Bangladesh and China. To day, the reverse can be seen, with hundreds of thousands of Burma's Citizens trying to find work elsewhere.

This March 13th is the 12th Anniversary of the death of R.I.T. student, Phone Maw, at the hands of the Military people. The incident sparked off the confrontation that led to the Four Eights Movement, which historic event people will long remember.

On the 27th of March, the Burma Military Celebrated the "55th Army Day" to commemorate the Day in 1945, when the Burmese Army turned then guns on their Japanese Allies and initiating the Resistance Movement. The Day was at first Celebrate as "Resistance Day" but later changed to "Army Day" by the Military to emphasize the decisive role played by the Burmese Army in routing the Japanese Army. Note worthy was the Address made by Senior General Than Shwe exhorting stepped up effort to eliminate the opposition on this "Army Day".

With the end of this March, there is report that salaries of workers in Burma will be increased Five fold which would be quite unique. The minimum wage will be Kyats 3000 with the maximum being Kyats 15,000 beginning April 2000. This must be one way to sooth the long suffering work people who are surviving on a starvation salary. But then, this may only be a mirage. Printing more bank notes will not solve the scarcity in produce commodities, which is the root cause of the country's sorry condition. In feet another round of spiraling inflation can be expected.

This month, the UN is focussing on Women's Rights, citing discrimination and violence against women still in practice in many countries. Seems, many believe women were just things to be exploited.

For the Refugees, though, the Talk of the day is Repatriation. Talk is that Repatriation may take place tomorrow, or in three years time for that matter. But, all indications are that it depends very much on whether the situation in Burma is conducive to "safe" return. Most comforting is the Prime Minister's speech, which openly stated, that Repatriation of Refugees, if it were to come, must be voluntary.

Of incidence of note elsewhere, on the 17th of this month, there was report of mass suicide (or Massacre?) of over three hundred people at a Church in Kanungu, Uganda. They were followers of the cult, "Restoration of the Ten commandments of God". Still more deaths of followers were found at other places bringing the total to over Nine hundred and Twenty. It is most sorrowful to see that, in this world of ours, there are still many people, who can cast their Evil Spell on others, making them do things that can only be called horrendous.
