S Nay Pong camp reported the receipt in September of 90 sacks of rice, 7 bags of salt from CCT and school sets from ZOA for the school children.

Ta Kong camp also reported the receipt of 90 sacks of rice from COERR.

Our report for this month shows a remarkable increase in the number of Karen refugees. This is because displaced Karens living on their own outside of the camps are required to move into the camps. Many are still outside. Should all move in, the number will be much higher.

We thank everyone for the help and support given to make life easier for the refugees. In light of the present situation in Burma it is very difficult indeed to know how long they will have to stay on. They need your help and support. Please also remember them in your prayers.
