#### MONTHLY REPORT

### JUNE 1992

The situation in Burma along its border with Thailand remains quiet for some time now but troops continue to be concentrated and dug in at the various battle fronts along the border. The rainy season has set in, though pretty late this year. It will go on for some months until rain stops usually around early October.

It looks as if the situation along the border will continue to be quiet through the rainy season. There is however very little chance for displaced people in the camps to sneak back across the border and grow crops. Some of them did try to do something but the prospect for them of gathering a harvest is bleak.

Sporadic fighting is reported in various places close to towns and villages inside Burma. Such military activities resulted almost all the time in reprisal by SLORC on civilians in the affected areas. Forced relocation is one of the drastic measures taken now by SLORC and as such, life for civilians in these affected areas has become more and more miserable and perilous. When life got too perilous and unbearable, many abandoned their homes and properties and fled from the area.

This program of forced relocation in different parts of the country has resulted in a remarkable increase again of late in the number of internally displaced people. Many fled to the border where as a large number of these people fled only to the hilly region in adjoining areas and are taking refuge there. It is not clear how long they could manage to survive there. If again survival for them is at stake they will have to move, most likely this time to the border to the refugee camps.

Schools in the camps have reopened now for the new academic year. As the camps population increases, the number of pupils in the camp schools also increases remarkably. The schools operate in very difficult circumstances but the parents and teachers in the various camp communities try to do the best they can for the education of the children. Help received from interested donors are of great benefit to the teachers and the students.

Likewise, the medical personnels and the camp communities work together for health and sanitation in the camps. Malaria is as ever a big problem in the camps. Respiratory infections and other tropical diseases are also common medical problems. Cases of dysentery have been reported in Wang Ka camp among children as well as adults.
