

Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker explains sending of messages

Nay Pyi Taw, 5 Nov - Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker Thura U Shwe Mann explained about the messages at eighth day session of the Hluttaw. The Speaker said that the Hluttaw has to send messages to parties concerned after making resolution about proposals at the Hluttaw. Likewise, it also sends messages as necessary in the interests of the nation and citizens. He emphasized that messages are sent to take actions for approved proposals while some proposals were decided to put on record and monitor.

Agencies concerned are obliged to handle the latter which they assume responsibility. Therefore, the Speaker pointed out, keeping records of fail-toapprove proposals have certain effects.

It is reported that the Speaker has sent 26 messages to the President, 11 to the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker, 9 to the Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker and one to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Union and has so far received 45 messages from the President.

Union Minister at the President Office U Soe Maung, regarding the question about whether there is a plan to appoint chief minister and ministers for Shan State (North), replied that there must be one Hluttaw and one government for Shan State under the constitution. As regards question about if there is any plan to designate “No driving Day” in cities like Yangon and Mandalay, the Union minister replied that there is no such plan for the time being.

Deputy Minister for Education U Aye Kyu, with regard to the question about if there is any plan to upgrade Myogon Village Basic Education Middle School in Shwegu Township to basic education high school (branch), replied that there is no plan to do so. With respect to question about whether there is a plan to upgrade No. 27 and No. 32 basic education post primary schools in Mingaladon Township to basic education middle schools, he replied that there is no such plan for the former but for the latter.

Four MPs discussed the report of Government Guarantees, Pledges and Undertakings Vetting Committee submitted on 24 October. It was informed to the Hluttaw that copies of Ward or Village Administration Bylaws sent by Home Affairs Ministry and Vacant, Fallow and Virgin Land Management Bylaws sent by Agriculture and Irrigation Ministry have been distributed among MPs for reference.

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
