Pyithu Hluttaw puts on record motion on Rakhine State

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The dilapidated border fence that stretches from the mouth of Tone creek to BP 66 is being repaired, the work for which started in September 2017. To increase security, double fences were erected in some places from October 2017 and will be completed in February 2018.

To prevent the infiltration

of terrorists, the area is being controlled by border police patrols and guard posts along the border fence. Joint patrols of the Myanmar-Bangladesh border police forces are being conducted and information on the activities of the terrorists is being shared through various means. To prevent the infiltration of terrorists along the sea route, the Tatmadaw (Navy) is conducting patrols along the Naf River, while the border police forces are setting up guard posts at the mouth of the creek. To allay fears of the local populace, the border police force is setting up a village security post, in cooperation with the

local people.

After the terrorist attacks on 25 August 2017, 129 police posts were regrouped into 95 and four new posts were set up. As of now, there are 11 station offices, 12 police stations, 16 milepost positions, 27 posts at the mouth of the creeks and 95 police posts, totalling 161, to conduct security and rule of law works.

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power line and substations are being set up. Yathedaung will get round-the-clock power supply in March 2018, Buthidaung in June 2018 and Maungtaung in December 2018. By that time, the three towns and 27,047 households in the nearby villages will have 24 hours of power supply, said the union minister.

The main aim of the government work in Rakhine State is to keep it free of conflict in the long run and maintain stability and development in the state. The government is implementing the UEHRD union project in accordance with policies and laws. On the matter of returnees, it is systematically implementing the

single bilateral agreement and two bilateral work group agreements between Bangladesh and Myanmar. Humanitarian aids are being provided in accordance with international norms.

The Rakhine State affairs affect the entire Myanmar. Thus, it is important to handle the problems of the people of Rakhine State with care. The union minister explained that the conduct of the government on this matter in the past, present and future was in accordance with the wishes of the people of Rakhine State and requested that the motion be put on record.

The Hluttaw decided to put the motion on record. ■

Pyithu Hluttaw puts on record motion on Rakhine State

The Pyithu Hluttaw debated over a motion on Rakhine State and put it on record during a meeting yesterday. Six questions on other issues were raised and answered, while a decision on the Myanmar Investment Rule was taken and approved. The Hluttaw was also informed about extending the terms of 14 Pyithu Hluttaw committees.

During the meeting, a motion tabled by U Aung Thaung Shwe from Buthidaung constituency urging the union government to develop effective plans for northern Rakhine's development and to share them openly with the public was dis-

cussed by U Hla Htun Kyaw of Maungdaw constituency, U Sein Win of Maubin constituency, Tatmadaw Pyithu Hluttaw representative Lt-Col Khin Maung Thant, Daw Ni Ni May Myint of Taungup constituency, U Htay Win Aung, alias U Pyone Cho, of Dawbon constituency, U Ba Shein of Kyaukpyu constituency, U Nyan Hein of Thanbyuzayat constituency, Daw Nan Than Than Lwin of Hpa-an constituency, U Pe Than of Myebon constituency, Daw Wint Wa Tun of Shadaw constituency, Tatmadaw Pyithu Hluttaw representative Major Than Win, Daw Aye Aye Mu, alias Daw Sharmie, of Kalay constituency, U Sai Kyaw Moe of Mongpan constituency, U Lagan Zal Jon of Waingmaw constituency, U Sai Aung Kyaw of Kehsi

constituency, U Oo Tun Win of Kyauktaw constituency and U Win Myint Oo, alias U Nay Myo, of Nyaungshwe constituency.

In his discussion on the motion, Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Re-

settlement Dr. Win Myat Aye said the Smart Garment factory, Khaing Pyi Soe Garment factory and Shwe Kya handloom factory were opened with the government's support in Sittway to help the local ethnic nationals acquire jobs and stay in their region. Some 250 women are already employed in these factories and are staying in their region. Efforts are being made to develop small and medium enterprises and to open larger garment factories.

For the benefit of the local populace, some 48 investment works have been approved, said the Union Minister.

For 50 villages in Kyaukpyu Township, a revolving fund of Ks30 million per village has been set up, and in cooperation with

Caterpillar Company, a course to operate heavy machineries was conducted.

With the support of GIZ (Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit GmbH), a German development agency, arrangements have been made for local women to attend a sewing course in Yangon.

In addition to these, agriculture courses, welding courses and small electrical appliances repair courses are being conducted. Discussing the security in Rakhine State, the union minister said a safe and secure border fence and security of the territorial waters are the main issues and the damaged border fences were repaired in the 2016-2017 fiscal year (FY).

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Amyotha Hluttaw discusses road upgradation, park construction

The seventh session of the second Amyotha Hluttaw held its 20th-day meeting yesterday at the Amyotha Hluttaw meeting hall, where asterisk-marked questions were asked and answered, two reports read and explained and a motion discussed.

First, U Kyaw Kyaw of Rakhine State constituency (4) raised a question on the plan to upgrade the earthen road up to Balipyin Village on the MraukU-Mahahti concrete road section in Rakhine State, MraukU Township to a gravel road. Union Minister for Construction U Han Zaw replied that the MraukU-Mahahti concrete road was managed by the Ministry of Construction's Department of Rural Development, while the earthen road up to Balipyin Village was built by the local villagers. The Rakhine State government has submitted to the Union Government office to include this road under the list of roads managed by the Ministry of Construction, according to procedure. Meanwhile, the upgradation work on 1 mile and 1 furlong of the 4-mile and 4-furlong earthen road was started in the 2017-2018 fiscal year (FY) period, with the Rakhine State government spending Ks35 million. Some 75 per cent of the work has been completed. Once it becomes a Ministry of Construction-managed road, funds will be allocated every FY and it

will be upgraded, explained the Union Minister.

Responding to a question raised by U Bwe Khane of Chin State constituency (3) on a plan to build a park in Haka Town during the 2018-2019 FY, Nay Pyi Taw Council member U Aung Myint Tun said the Haka Township Development Affairs Department was arranging to construct a park on a 5-acre plot in Khuasilobo, Haka Town. In the 2018-2019 budget allocation, the park construction has been listed as second priority, and Ks150 million was requested for the park and a reservoir (including the fence around the reservoir). If the budget is allocated, the park will be constructed, said U Aung Myint Tun.

Replying to a question posed by Naw Hla Hla Soe of the Yangon region constituency (10) on relocating the Taungthukone-Yodaya market in the Yangon Re-

gion's Insein Township, as waste from the market was causing health and social problems, fire hazards and traffic blocks, Nay Pyi Taw Council member U Aung Myint Tun said the market came into existence some 30 years ago, and there were some 200 temporary vendors selling along the 1,000-foot-long and 12-foot-wide road. The temporary sellers were allocated stalls in the Bokone market, some 2,500 feet from the Yodaya market, but most of them moved back to the old market after selling their stalls to others. The Bokone market is on a 320x100 square feet plot with six market sheds having 251 shops. (Only) 38 temporary vendors are operating there. Although the Bokone market has a 27x55 square feet open space, this is not sufficient to accommodate all the temporary sellers in Yodaya market. As no other suitable places are

available in the vicinity, there is no plan to relocate the Yodaya market, said U Aung Myint Tun.

However, to prevent health problems and the occurrence of dengue, 323 houses in the area were provided with mosquito nets, mosquito repellents and Abate application. The Insein Township Public Health Department is conducting fogging operations, while the veterinary department is conducting rodent and stray dog control measures. The Yangon City Development Committee Engineering Department (roads and bridges) has also constructed two box culverts and improved the water flow of the 12,000-foot-long Kawthwe creek that flows through the Taungthukone ward, explained U Aung Myint Tun.

Next, the report by the bill committee on the findings and comments about the bill on the registration of deeds was read by bill committee member U Lal Min Htan. The bill on the registration of deeds, approved and returned with amendments by the Pyithu Hluttaw, was then decided by the Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker Mahn Win Khaing Than announced the approval of the Hluttaw.

Bill committee member U Kyaw Kyaw then read the bill committee report on a bill amending the Caste Disabilities Removal Act, returned without amendment by the Pyithu Hluttaw, for the Hluttaw to discuss it, and Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker

Mahn Win Khaing Than requested the Hluttaw representatives who wanted to discuss the bill to enrol their names.

Later, a motion urging the government to give priority to the least developed states and regions and to implement the One Village One Product (OVOP) rural development strategy with the relevant ministerial departments, including a budget for it, tabled by Daw Htu May of Rakhine State constituency (11) was discussed by U Kyaw Myint Oo of the Mandalay region constituency (10), Tatmadaw Amyotha Hluttaw representative Major Htet Linn, U Mya Min Swe of the Bago region constituency (9), U Than Soe, also known as Than Soe (Economic), of the Yangon region constituency (4) and Daw Shah Mu of Kayah State constituency (5).

In his discussion on the motion, Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw said there were many things the government needed to do for rural development, and the motion required a long-term plan to implement it. Based on the discussions made on the motion, the deputy minister asked the motion to be put on record.

Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker Mahn Win Khaing Than then asked to not put the motion on record after the Hluttaw voted 71 for, 106 against and seven abstentions on the motion. The 21st-day meeting of the seventh session of the second Amyotha Hluttaw will be held on 21 February. ■

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
